Princess Basma Centre for Children with Disabilities

In partnership with other Episcopal churches in the Southeast District, Christ Church will be raising funds to assist the Princess Basma Centre for Children with Disabilities. It is a charitable, non-governmental, non-profit institution entrusted under the Anglican Episcopal Church. It provides services for children with disabilities in Palestine.

The Princess Basma Centre, established in 1965, works on the integration and empowerment of children with disabilities and their families in their communities through physical rehabilitation and education. Father Troy toured the facility during his recent pilgrimage to the Holy Land. He saw first-hand the impact of this important ministry as well as the desperate need for additional funding.

During the summer, Christ Church will have specially designated containers to collect funds for the Princess Basma Centre for Children with Disabilities. Checks may be made payable to Christ Church. It is also helpful if you write "Basma" on the memo line to avoid confusion. Your help and support of this ministry is greatly appreciated.

A donation has been made in honor of the men of Christ Church to Five Rivers Council. The funds will be used to help provide scholarships to Camp Gordon to send boys who might not normally be able to afford it. Camp Gordon is located outside of Dundee, NY, on beautiful Waneta Lake. During the summer, Camp Gordon offers both Cub Scout resident camp and Boy Scout resident camp programs.

Our fellowship time will be moved outside on the front church steps area beginning July 2. There will be refreshments and cold beverages every Sunday. We are hoping this will make it more convenient for folks to stay and visit. In the event of rain, we will set up in Houghton Lounge.



The choir is taking a much needed rest and will return to lead congregational singing on September 17. We will be having guest soloists and instrumentalists over the summer.

PEEKS AT THE PAST

HISTORY-MAKING NEWS FOR JULY AND AUGUST

Summer 1902—115 years ago: The Vestry ordered the church closed for five weeks during the summer as usual.

Summer 1922—95 years ago: The rector, George Kincaid, pleaded with parishioners to continue to attend church during the summer months.

Summer 1972—45 years ago: The Flood and Christ Church. The 18 inches of clear water which seeped into the undercroft after the flood ruined the entire undercroft floor. Four inches of water also covered the floors of the lower parish hall.

Fifty percent of parish families were seriously affected by the flood, and the rector, Scott Harvin, made personal contact with 184 of these families.

The Rev. Alton Stivers, St. James, Watkins Glen, became the message carrier for Christ Church, bringing news to Corning from parishioners relocated to various nursing homes and hospitals, and carrying messages from here to the "outside world."

August 1992—25 years ago: The Rev. Salvatore Mistretta, a new member of Christ Church, supplied as celebrant for four summer Sundays while Rector Jorge Gutierrez and family were on vacation.

Summer 2012—5 years ago: Diana Macko agreed to be the coordinator for the Church School for the coming year.

Visitors to Christ Church came from: Vista, CA; and Bath and Corning, both in NY.

Members of Christ Church worshipped at: St. John's Episcopal Church, Youngstown, NY; St. John's Episcopal Church, Naples, and St. John's Church, Tampa, both in FL.
